Religious leader dies; body left for three days

Members of a religious group here watched their leader, Yahowha, slowly die from injuries suffered in a hang-gliding accident Monday, then let his body lie untouched for three days in their Lanikai home, The Advertiser has learned.

Disciples of the group, which was known as the Aquarians when it first broke into the news on Kauai, say they picked up their leader after the accident and took him home to die, refusing to seek medical assistance because it is against their religious beliefs. They said Yahowha died nine hours after the accident, which

THE SECT REPORTED the death to police yesterday morning. An autopsy has not yet been performed. Bolice officials are uncertain about possible charges against the group.

One charge might be failure to report a death, which according to State law must be done within 24 hours.
